REPORT ON EXPENDITURE OF FINANCIAL GRANT BY ASSOCIAZIONE IMMAGINARTE AND MUSICFOR TO THE CAPE TRADITIONAL SINGERS AND BRASS BAND IN TERMS OF ITS PROGRAMME "A SPRING FOR SOUTH AFRICA IMMAGINARTE 2018"

We hereby again sincerely thank you for selecting Cape Traditional Singers and Brass Band as beneficiary of your funding programme "A Spring for South Africa ImagginArte 2018".

We hereby confirm that we were granted a gross amount of ZAR32 725.00 (the "Grant") which has been allocated to be spent as follows:

Musical Tuition and Instruments:ZAR 20 000.00Uniforms:ZAR 10 000.00Meals and Transport:ZAR 2 725.00

The major part of the Grant will be expended on continuous musical tuition, particularly brass and drum instruments, which will primarily be used during the festive season carnival calendar commencing on 16 December 2018 and ends over Easter weekend 2019. The Grant also covers items such as instruments, transport, meals and payments to musical tutors. Furthermore, the Grant will be used for the purchase of fabrics and other material and the labour used to manufacture the uniforms and outfits that will be used for official events during the 2018/2019 carnival season.

As the Cape Traditional Singers and Brass Band serve an impoverished part of the community in Cape Town, South Africa, we aim to utilise as many of the community members for the services required, i.e. seamstresses (for uniforms), drivers, cooks etc. Due to the informal nature of the service providers, invoices are rarely issued as all transactions are small, informal and ad hoc. We do, however, regularly take pictures of services, tuition classes and new uniforms in support of our

activities and expenditure. We also invite donors and network partners to our activities in order for them to witness the impact of their donor funding.

Please contact us should you require any further information.

We look forward to a long and mutually beneficial collaboration with Associazione ImmaginArte and Musicfor and we hope that we will be able to share our music and our culture with you and your supporters in Italy and beyond.

ABOUT CAPE TRADITIONAL SINGERS AND BRASS BAND

The Cape Traditional Singers and Brass Band was established in Mitchell's Plain in 1982. It is constituted by singers and musicians ranging from 200 (permanently active) to up to 1000 during carnival periods. Its registered members range between 6 and 78 years of age.

The Cape Traditional Singers and Brass Band specialise in two types of singing and musical expression endemic to the Western Cape: Cape Malay Choral singing and Cape Minstrel singing and carnival music.


We mainly performs at local and international cultural festivals. Since the 1990's, the Cape Traditional Singers and Brass Band has performed at more than 10 major international festivals in cities including Amsterdam, Barcelona, Istanbul, Madrid, Lisbon, Paris and Salzburg. These outbound collaborations are mainly done on a bilateral basis with support of performing arts organizations in the host countries. Subject to the available budget, the international tours are normally undertaken by 25 to 30 of our most promising singers and musicians and it is used to <u>inspire and teach particularly our younger, more talented singers and musicians of what can be achieved beyond the poverty and squaller of their own environment.</u>

In 2002, its unique recording of songs traditionally sung at the Cape, entitled "South Africa: The Cape Town Minstrels" (Buda Records, Musique du Monde), was critically acclaimed by local and international scholars and followers of "World Music". The following was said about the recording:

"Some Rare Jewels

This is a selection of some of the best-known songs performed traditionally by the Kaapse Klopse, mostly of Malay descent, especially during New Year in Cape Town. I have searched quite a long time for a good selection of this type of music. I was definitely not disappointed. The songs are in Afrikaans, Dutch and one in English. Of great interest to me

are the few songs sung in Dutch, i.e. Rosa, Ons Prinsje nou so klein and others suggesting that these songs are probably very old."



REPERTOIRE

The Cape Traditional Singers and Brass Bands' repertoire is based on 2 different categories of Cape Malay and Cape Minstrel songs:

1. Moppies (Comics) and Ghoema Liedjies

Moppies (comic songs) are usually built in the form of medleys, melodies, rhythms and bits of history in succession without any logical order. It is set in motion by the gesture of the soloist in order to arouse laughter.

Ghoemaliedjies (drum songs) are based on the characteristic rhythm of the ghoema drum. They were an essential ingredient of all festive meetings and picnics in particular during colonial times at the Cape.

2. Nederlandse Liedjies

Nederlandsjiedjies are, the exclusive prerogative of the Cape Malay choirs and are probably the most original Cape directory. Their lyrics are in Afrikaans, sometimes in old Dutch transformed by oral transmission.

The soloist sings in a very particular voice (high register, soft, shiny and patchy at times) referred to as the "karienkel". The melody has a modal style and gives a sense of "Oriental" interpretation, but the choir sings the arrangements firmly anchored in Western tonal harmony (most often organized according to the progression I IV V).

Freedom of phrasing of the soloist, the absence of regular periods in the relationship of the soloist and the choir and the texture created by the karienkel and the elongation or, conversely, the pick-up with respect to the timing set for certain syllables by the choir gives the nederlandsliedjie undeniable originality. The nederlandsliedjie have similarities with the Indonesian krontjong, a Creole genre born from the meeting in the 15th and 16th centuries of Portuguese sailors and islanders of eastern Indonesia. However, the harmonization of the choral parts obviously denote Europe.

Thus, the repertoire of the Cape Traditional singers reflect a rich musical history based on Oriental, European and African rhythms and serves to

preserve a part of the Afrikaans language that is unique, full of colour and wonderfully textured.

ACTIVITIES AND COMMUNITY SERVICE

The Cape Traditional Singers and Brass Band operate all year- long and its "club-house" serves as a place of happiness, music, feeding, healing and safe harbour for many children and young adults who typically have no opportunities in life and who are almost doomed to gangsterism and drug related ills. We administer a largely self-funded (with occasional donor funding) weekly musical tuition programme for brass, drum and string instruments and a weekly feeding scheme in the Mitchell's Plain area. Each member (mostly unemployed or partially employed in informal type activities) is fully remunerated whenever performances are paid for by clients whom we seek out as it creates income generating opportunities for our members from time to time. The Cape Traditional Singers and Brass Band itself operate on a non-profit basis and all money raised or earned go towards the activities of the organisation and/or the upliftment of its members and the community that it serves.

Furthermore, a total of 10 disenfranchised women (all previous workers in the now defunct textile industry of the Western Cape) are "employed" by the broader organisation during carnival periods for the cutting, finishing and trimming of carnival uniforms.

LEADERSHIP

Choir Master

Anwar Gambeno is the founder and choirmaster of the Cape Traditional Singers.

His history is one of a focussed, incessant preservation of the music and the culture of the so called "Coloured People" at the Cape.

In his book, Coon Carnival, New Year in Cape Town, Past and Present (David Philip Publishers, 1999), Professor Denis Constant Martin says the following:

"To Anwar Gambeno I owe many insights on the history of the Malay Choirs and their repertoires, the way they are coached as well as the experience of his wonderful hospitality..."

During the early 1980's, Afrikaans literary luminaries like the late Dr I.D. Du Plessis, described him as "a true talent and promoter of the Afrikaans language spoken by the brown people at the Cape".

Notwithstanding his lack of formal education and training, Anwar Gambeno regularly lectures undergraduate and post-graduate music students at the University of Cape Town and the University of Stellenbosch on traditional music found at the Cape.

Administrator

Muneeb Gambeno is responsible for all aspects of administration of the Cape Traditional Singers and Brass Band and is an active singer in the choir.

A graduate of the prestigious University of Cape Town and ex-Norton Rose Fulbright attorney, he has led legal teams at various multi-national blue chip companies prior to following his passion for entrepreneurship.

Muneeb ensures that the Cape Traditional Singers and Brass Band is managed and governed in a robust, transparent manner in order to ensure maximum value for its members, stakeholders, clients and audiences.


